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1868 -1928 Charles Rennie Mackintosh was born in Glasgow on 7th June 1868 He became an apprentice architect for a company in Glasgow He enrolled in evening classes at Glasgow School of Art in the 18qos Here he won prizes for his work and an award that allowed him to take a tour of Italy and study the architecture there Charles also met
